- Who is LCA? Review of municipal authority structure, purpose, mission – non-profit, local, non-taxing, public, etc.
- Review of Lease Reminder that the City was trying to solve its pension problem and those debts still need to be paid
- System Operations & Maintenance Significant prior project deferrals and aging infrastructure are driving up long-term costs. Continued deferral puts public health at risk!
- Financial Performance Revenue increase is required to support project financing and high debt burden due to lease
- Rate Impact Review of rates provided in the lease & how they impact customers. Reminder that we cannot change what's in the lease without City participation!
- Public Input Can be used if City is willing to discuss alternatives!

Public Input Received – Major Themes

- Lease was a bad deal / LCA failed to do proper research / etc.
- Others should help pay suburban communities, businesses, etc.
- What do we get in exchange for paying more?

- Increase in fixed charge unfairly distributes greatest increase to smallest water users
- Rate increase is on top of other bills like the new stormwater fee
- Seniors / low-income / fixed-income households impacted the most
- Increase in fixed charge means customers can't control impact by using less water

Alternative Rate Structures Possible?


- Yes! There are other (possibly better) ways to increase rates to address revenue requirements of the system.
- However...
 - LCA financial requirements still need to be met, so change in structure simply serves to shift cost from one customer to another
 - Adding increase to fixed charges is appropriate for LCA's cost / debt structure
 - Lease Agreement defines the rates and rate structure and doing anything other than what's in the Lease would require City agreement, bondholder and trustee review, credit rating review, etc.

Alternative Rate Structures & Examples

- Only increase sewer rates, which are disproportionately low
- Add increase into volume charge:
 - Distributes cost to higher users
 - Allows customers to manage impact through conservation
 - Would require discussion with municipalities who pay based on volume charge
- Add increase to quarterly rates, avoid cost of monthly billing
- Conservation based rates inclining block rate
- Income-based rate structure
- Lifeline rates

Allentown Water vs. Sewer Rates

	Quarterly Allentown Water	Monthly Allentown Water	Water Regional Average	Quarterly Allentown Sewer	Monthly Allentown Sewer	Sewer Regional Average
Annual Fixed Charge	\$111.40	\$230.76	\$136.80	\$38.64	\$80.28	\$245.22
Volume Charge per 1000 gallons	\$3.64	\$3.64	\$5.27	\$2.54	\$2.54	\$3.78

- Water fixed charge in Allentown is below average for quarterly, but well above average for monthly billing (appropriate for a highly debt-burdened system)
- Sewer fixed charges (both quarterly and monthly) in Allentown disproportionately low and far below regional average
- Both water and sewer volume charges are below regional averages

Add Increase to Quarterly Rates?

- Lower impact to customers by avoiding costs of monthly billing
- However, this option eliminates positive impacts:
 - Improved household budgeting as rates continue to increase over time
 - Water conservation / early leak detection
 - Improved cash flow for LCA
 - Improved collections performance
 - Industry best practice

Billing Expenses (print / postage)	\$ 130,472
Payment Processing	\$ 116,400

Upfront Implementation Costs	\$ 285,000

Lifeline Rates

 Mixes Fixed & Volume Charges into a single rate for small users

Example:

- LCA Welshtown Road water only
 - Annual Fixed Charge \$240.00
 - Includes 32,000 gallons per year (2,667 gallons per month)
 - Excess usage \$5.50/1000 gallons

Average customer here pays same as Allentown monthly water rate proposed, but cost burden shifted to higher users.

Alternative Rate Structures Possible?

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Recommendation:

- Implement monthly billing using City's existing rate schedule per the Lease
- Provides revenue increase required now to address system expenses for debt service and system improvements
- Remain open to discussion with City on alternatives for the future which could help citizens, but which requires Lease review / update
